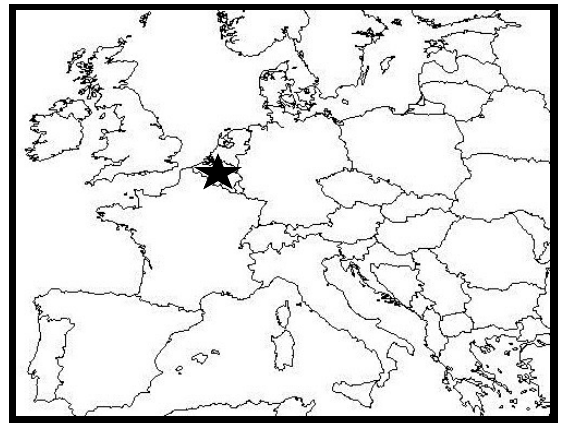

## PROGRAM

ISA at Vesalius College provides the opportunity to study in one of the major business and government capitals of Europe. One quarter of the students studying at Vesalius are international students, providing a diverse and unique student population. Your courses are taught by host university faculty, and your classmates are international and Belgian students. Several excursions are included with the program. ISA provides a thorough orientation and very supportive on-site staff.

## ACADEMICS

You may choose from a variety of courses in English, including business, communications, economics, history, political science, sociology, French language, and Dutch language. You may also choose to do an internship for credit: Working in a sponsoring firm or organization, students undertake a 150-hour, semester-long project on a theme or topic related to their major. It requires students to work on-site at least 10 hours per week, keep a daily activity log and write a project report. Pre-requisites: Students in their third year or higher, good academic standing and approval by the Internship Committee.

## LOCATION: BRUSSELS, BELGIUM

Although Brussels has over two million inhabitants, it maintains a more intimate feeling than many Western European capitals. The city is the home to NATO, the Council of the EU, and the European Parliament. Brussels is located in the middle of Belgium, less than 200 miles from Amsterdam, Paris and London. Due to the countries it borders, Belgium's three official languages are Dutch, French and German; English is widely spoken in Brussels.

## HOUSING & MEALS

You may choose to live with a host family or in an apartment in Brussels. Each homestay has been carefully selected. Living in a homestay, you are provided with breakfast seven days a week and dinner five days a week for the official duration of the program. You will have access to laundry facilities. If you choose to live in an apartment, you will be placed with other Americans on the ISA program, and you will not have a meal plan. You may not choose independent housing.

## CULTURAL CONNECTIONS

In addition to your daily interaction with your host family, the internship opportunities that this program offers is perhaps one of the best ways for students to interact with the people of Brussels, as well as a way to learn valuable cross-cultural skills. Furthermore, ISA students have full access to the athletic facilities (including playing on recreational teams) at Vesalius College and the Vrije Universiteit Brussel (VUB). Participating in sports is a great way to meet local and other international students on campus.

Once you have been nominated for this program, you will be required to submit the following:

- ISA Application Supplement (3 pages; download upon completion of the online application)
- Optional: ISA Scholarship Application.
