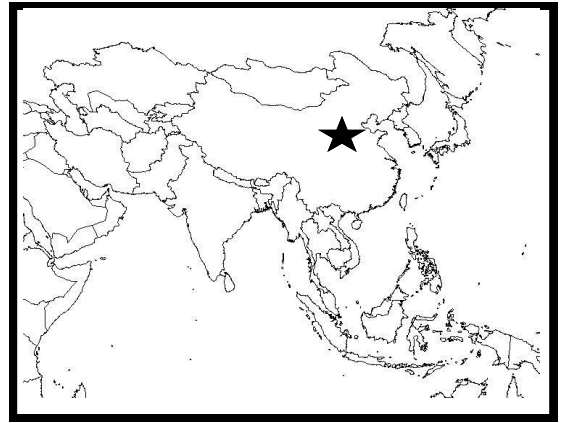

PROGRAM

The University of Denver offers this program in cooperation with the China Studies Institute, which was established over 20 years ago with the help of American University. The program is associated with the School of International Studies and the History Department at Peking University. The majority of students on the program are from the US and are provided with strong staff support. Peking University was founded in 1898 as the first national university and is considered by many to be the best in China. The Beijing program is the only DU-approved location.

ACADEMICS

Areas of study include business, economics, history, international studies, literature, political science, and all levels of Mandarin Chinese. Most of the courses are taught by Chinese professors who have been educated in the US or the UK. You enroll in 6 semester credits of language and choose three or four other courses to complete the program. For students who are qualified, internship opportunities are available in many fields. If you wish to complete an internship, it would replace one of the content courses. U.S. students interact with the Chinese students in a few of the same classes. The language of instruction for all the content courses is English.

LOCATION: BEIJING, CHINA

With nearly 17 million people, Beijing is a sprawling city. It is the political and cultural capital of China. The city attracts people from all regions of the country and is filled with history and is making way for the future. Many refer to Beijing as the center of the world's largest economy. It has become a magnet for international business and investment. The city is lined with modern skyscrapers intermixed with traditional Asian architecture. It is a true contrast, with noodle stands placed next to McDonald's restaurants.

HOUSING & MEALS

You will live in the foreign students' residence hall on the university campus. The rooms are shared facilities with other students participating on the program. Normally there are three students per room. There is wireless internet connection within the rooms, although you should be prepared for outages. Meals are not included with the program but may be bought inexpensively in the dining facilities or in local restaurants. There is a limited number of off-campus apartments.

CULTURAL CONNECTIONS

The program organizes a two-week study tour as an essential component of the classroom learning. In addition, there are other excursions which include visiting various cities around China. Beijing offers many historical sites and cultural celebrations, as well as nearby cultural sites. The university offers many student clubs and opportunities for sports. You can join the gym for a small fee for the semester or play a game of pick-up soccer.

Student Costs**:

- Meals

The cost of living varies in other cities and countries. Talk to returnees from the program to find out what personal expenses to expect, but remember that they vary by lifestyle. Check www.xe.com for current exchange rates.
