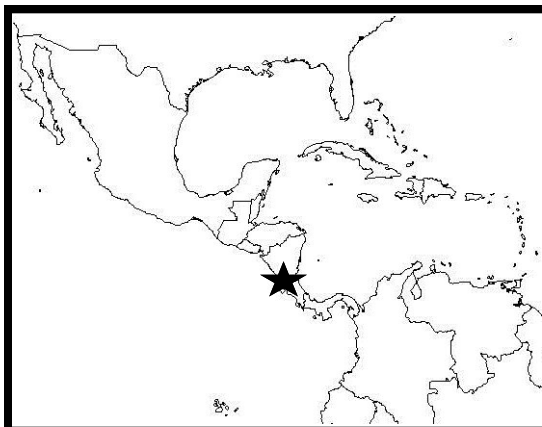

PROGRAM

The University of Denver offers this program in cooperation with The School for Field Studies (SFS). Founded in 1980, SFS was established as an environmental study abroad program. SFS programs are hands-on, interdisciplinary, experiential, and emphasize working with community partners to examine environmental issues and identify conservation solutions.

ACADEMICS

The semester program in Sustainable Development Studies examines tropical ecology, globalization, economics, and the socio-cultural issues related to natural resource management in Costa Rica's protected areas. This program has a set curriculum. Students take courses in Tropical Ecology and Sustainable Development; Economic and Ethical Issues in Sustainable Development; Principles of Resource Management; Directed Research; and Language, Culture, and Society of Costa Rica (27 credits total). Students on SFS programs spend a minimum of 40% of their time in the field. This is a highly structured, intensive program with six days per week spent in academic activities. The semester culminates in a directed field research project, which many students say is the most rewarding aspect of the program.

LOCATION: ATENAS, COSTA RICA

The SFS Field Station is located west of San José in La Presa (pop. 200), on the outskirts of Atenas in the Central Valley. Four rivers converge in this area; the Field Station is surrounded by orange and mango orchards. La Presa has approximately 200 residents. Atenas, while still considered a small town, offers good public transportation, supermarkets, internet cafés, and banks.

HOUSING & MEALS

Students live in dormitories (up to four to a room) at the SFS Center for Sustainable Development Studies field station. The field station includes a large house, outdoor classroom, organic garden, library/computer room, and a small laboratory. Meals are included. Students will assist with cooking, cleaning, and working in the Center's garden.

CULTURAL CONNECTIONS

SFS participants are encouraged to become involved in community service projects such as teaching English, environmental education in local schools, and reforestation projects. Students will participate in program-sponsored field trips, which typically include visits to cloud forests, volcanic parks, rainforests, plantations, and an extended expedition to Nicaragua.

PREREQUISITES

Prior to the start of the program, applicants must have taken at least one college-level ecology or environmental studies class and two quarters of college-level Spanish.

Student Costs**:

The cost of living varies in other cities and countries. Talk to returnees from the program to find out what personal expenses to expect, but remember that they vary by lifestyle. Check www.xe.com for current exchange rates.

PROGRAM APPLICATION: DUE AFTER YOU'VE BEEN NOMINATED

Once you have been nominated for program, you will be required to submit the following:

- Download and Complete the SFS Application for Admission including the Participant Approval Form, Academic Reference Form, Character Reference Form, and Essay responses.

DO NOT use the SFS online application, as you will be charged an application fee. This fee is waived for DU students using the printed application.

- Academic and Character References should be submitted to the OIE in a signed, sealed envelope.
