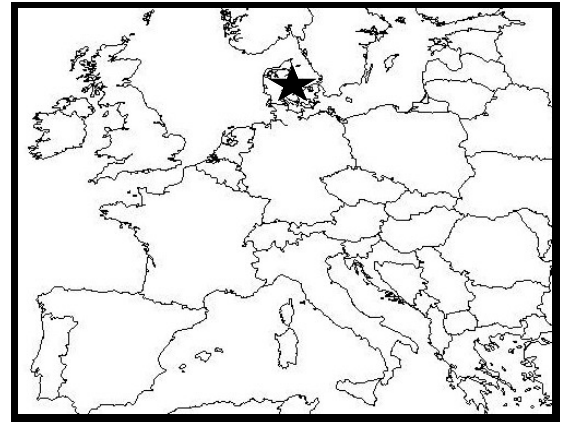

## PROGRAM

The University of Denver offers this program in cooperation with the Danish Institute for Study Abroad (DIS). Founded in 1959, the DIS program offers classes taught in English by Danish professors and is affiliated with the University of Copenhagen. The program enrolls over 600 students each semester, the majority of whom come from the U.S. DIS offers complete support.

## ACADEMICS

You will build your own curriculum by choosing a core course/program and a variety of electives. Program choices include Architecture and Design, Biomedicine, Child Diversity and Development, Communication and Mass Media, European Culture and History, European Politics, Global Economics, International Business, Justice and Human Rights, Medical Practice and Policy, Migration and Conflict, Pre-Architecture, Psychology, Public Health, and Sustainability in Europe. Most courses include course-integrated field studies in Denmark, as well as one international study tour. Professors are typically Danish, but all classes are taught in English.

## LOCATION: COPENHAGEN, DENMARK

Copenhagen is the capital city of Denmark with a population of 1.5 million people. It is a vibrant European city with old world charm and the most modern conveniences. It has a small town feel, yet is also Scandinavia's largest city. Denmark is a modern democracy and the world's oldest existing monarchy. The country has a free market economy and a social welfare system with limited social inequality and no real poverty, a fact that contributes to the low crime rate. Copenhagen's location in Europe makes it a convenient location to study, allowing you to easily travel throughout the continent. Copenhagen's rich history makes it a city to explore. With its comprehensive public transportation system, you will be able to take advantage of the many museums, galleries, and historical cathedrals.

## HOUSING & MEALS

You will be offered accommodation in a home, a student residence hall (*Kollegium*), with a Danish roommate, in DIS residential communities, or in a *folkehojskole* (a distinctly Danish rural educational institution for young Danes). In the family stays you are supplied meals, while in the residence halls and DIS residential communities you have access to kitchens in which you will do your own cooking. No meal plan is available with the residence halls. You may not choose independent housing.

## CULTURAL CONNECTIONS

DIS offers rich opportunities for social and cultural immersion in the Danish culture. You can participate in sports or music clubs, as well as volunteer in the community.
