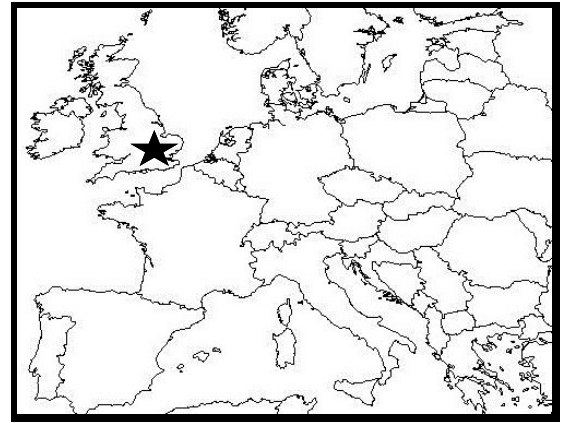

PROGRAM

Study alongside local students at the University of Westminster while doing an internship in the community, giving you exposure to both a foreign institution and workplace. Westminster has some 20,000 students (20% are international!) enrolled at 3 campuses (Cavendish, Marylebone, and Regent) in the city center and 1 in a northwestern suburb (Harrow). The International Office provides excellent on-site support and social programs.

ACADEMICS

All DU students at Westminster are required to apply for the internship and 3 other courses, a total of 4 classes. A wide variety of internships are available. See their [web-site](#) for more on the internships. Each of Westminster's 4 campuses house different academic departments. The *Harrow Campus* has art, design, fashion, film, photography, communication, media, and journalism (the Harrow Campus stands out as an academic strength for DU students). The *Marylebone Campus* has business courses (including tourism); the *Regent Campus* has social sciences, law, and the humanities (the English Department offers 6 unique "London-focused" classes ideal for learning about the city itself, local field trips, and meeting other non-degree students); *Cavendish campus* has life and computer sciences. LOCATION: LONDON, ENGLAND, UK

London is the capital city of the UK and home to nearly 8 million people. Dr. Samuel Johnson once said, "When a man is tired of London, he is tired of life"; it's famed for its museums, music, palaces, parks, pubs, and vibrant commerce. While Westminster's 3 centrally located campuses are in London city center, they do not have the campus layout of many American universities—their buildings are dispersed among the shops, businesses and restaurants in the northwest corner of downtown, near Regent Park. The Harrow campus, in contrast, offers the campus-based, suburban atmosphere familiar to DU students. Living in Harrow gives a more accurate glimpse of where most Londoners live (rather than work). Harrow is a 40-minute subway ride from downtown.

HOUSING & MEALS

Housing is in private bedrooms with kitchen and bathroom facilities shared with local and international students. Most halls in central London are not in the immediate vicinity of the campuses; you must be prepared to commute. The Harrow Campus has its own residence halls.

CULTURAL CONNECTIONS

Besides London abundant cultural activities, the students' union offers a huge range of societies, clubs, and events. For more, see the [website](#). The internship program is a unique avenue to experience the professional life in London beyond Westminster (see Academics).

HOW TO APPLY

⇒ **Attend Study Abroad 101**

Held weekdays at the I-House. See website for schedule (www.du.edu/intl/abroad/info_sessions.html).

⇒ **Attend a Regional Advising Session**

Mandatory if you are considering the UK or Ireland. See website for schedule (same link as above).

⇒ **Meet with an international education advisor.**

Learn about your options and get answers to your questions.

⇒ **Apply for a passport—<http://travel.state.gov/passport>**

If you already have one, make sure you know where it is and when it expires.

⇒ **Apply to study abroad!**

- Academic Advisor's signature on your completed and printed online application form
- DU short-answer essays
- Official transcript(s) from other universities attended, if applicable
- Non-Cherrington students will be charged a \$50 application fee to their DU account.

Note: *Cherrington status may be revoked at any time due to a change in your student conduct or academic status. Also, the OIE will request your DU transcript; check and clear any holds now to avoid delays in processing your application!*

PROGRAM APPLICATION: DUE AFTER YOU'VE BEEN NOMINATED

Once you've been nominated for this program, you will be required to submit the following:

- Completed "Undergraduate Study Abroad Application Form" (downloadable from their [website](#)) with supporting documents. *There is no application fee for DU; skip "Section 9: Application Fee."*
- If applying for practical classes in the School of Communication and Creative Industries at the Harrow Campus, a portfolio of your work
- Completed "Internship Placement Information and Application Materials" with supporting documents
