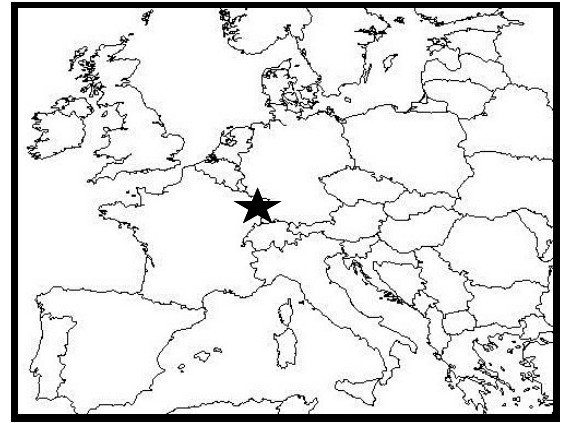

## PROGRAM

The Syracuse Center in Strasbourg is located just a few minutes walk from both the Council of Europe and the University of Strasbourg. The Center has a permanent staff and a resident academic director, as well as classrooms, lounges, a small computer lab, reading room, and e-mail facilities. As a student at Syracuse, you have the option to take classes that are arranged and taught through the Center, or you can enroll in local universities (see section below for more detail). Regardless of where you take your classes, you will receive orientation and ongoing support from the Syracuse staff throughout the length of your studies.

## ACADEMICS

There are three options to choose from at SU Strasbourg, depending on your language level: Option I—take classes at the Syracuse Center in both English and French; Option II—an intensive language and culture program for students with at least one year of college-level French; Option III—enroll directly in classes with French students (for advanced students only). Political science internships and independent research projects are available at the Council of Europe.

## LOCATION: STRASBOURG, FRANCE

With just over 700,000 people, Strasbourg is the capital of the Alsace region and the ninth largest metropolitan area in France. Historically, Strasbourg has been violently disputed, but today it stands as a unique and fascinating fusion of Franco-German culture. It's historic city center, "Grand Island," was classified as a World Heritage site by UNESCO in 1988. As the seat of several European institutions, such as the Council of Europe and the European Parliament, Strasbourg occupies an important place in the geographic, social, and political unity of Europe.

## HOUSING & MEALS

You will live with a carefully selected host family, either within the city of Strasbourg or in the immediate outskirts on a bus line. Living with a French family is the best way to improve your language skills as well as develop insight into French culture that cannot be achieved any other way. Breakfasts are provided by your host every day, and dinner is provided every weeknight. Students typically eat lunch at a café or student restaurant.

## CULTURAL CONNECTIONS

Expect to be deeply engaged with your studies and host culture. Field study and site visits throughout Europe are integral to the academic program, and your home-stay will round out both your personal and educational experience. You may also consider supplementing your academic program with a valuable internship.

⇒ **Attend Study Abroad 101**

- Non-Cherrington students will be charged a \$50 application fee to their DU account.

**Note:** *Cherrington status may be revoked at any time due to a change in your student conduct or academic status. Also, the OIE will request your DU transcript; check and clear any holds now to avoid delays in processing your application!*

The OIE will review applications, conduct interviews, and nominate 3 students for study with Syracuse. If you are nominated, you will then complete the SU Abroad application form along with its requirements (academic recommendation and study abroad approval from). Your OIE advisor will give you more details about the Syracuse application once you have been nominated.

**Warning:** You must secure a student visa in order to study in France, a process that may require significant additional travel and expense.



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
