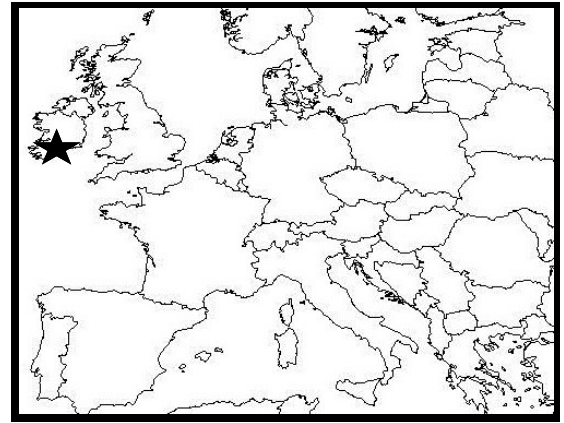

## PROGRAM

Live and study with local and international students at the beautiful campus of the University College Cork (UCC). It opened its doors in 1849 and now enrolls more than 18,000 students —2,000 of which are international students. The campus is about a 15-minute walk from the city center. UCC's International Office provides on-site support and an orientation for all incoming study abroad students. Its Early Start Program provides US students with a higher level of structure during the initial month of the program (see Academics).

## ACADEMICS

With UCC's 4 colleges and over 60 academic departments, coursework in most academic disciplines is available and includes Celtic studies and Gaelic language. Engineering, math, and statistics modules run only on an academic year basis. Academic certificates, e.g., "Irish Studies" or "Irish Political Issues," are possible. Numerous internships are offered. See the [website](#) for current course (module) offerings. UCC offers 6 "Early Start Program," a course for US students that is held during the 4 weeks prior to the start of regular semester. It provides several field trips, extra time to get acquainted with to Cork, with UCC, and with other study

abroad students before the regular semester begins. There are 6 Early Start Programs, each with a unique academic focus, e.g., "Irish Archeology," "Management and Marketing in the EU." Topics are posted their [website](#). Note the Early Start Program is an additional expense.

## LOCATION: CORK, IRELAND

While Cork is the second largest city in Ireland, it has about 200,000 residents. It has the conveniences of a city with the friendly atmosphere of an Irish college town. Cork rivals Dublin in the quality and quantity of its restaurants, pubs, and clubs. It buzzes with the energy of a city on the rise and was named the European Capital of Culture in 2005. It's situated near the southern coast about 3 hours from of Dublin (by train) at the head of the inlet of Cork Harbor with good access to other parts of Ireland. The city of Cork offers loads of entertainment, including theatres, cinemas, music venues, jazz, and film festivals.

## HOUSING & MEALS

Housing is usually in a private bedroom with shared bathroom and kitchen facilities in student complexes or apartments within walking distance of UCC and downtown.

## CULTURAL CONNECTIONS

UCC's Students Union has over 100 societies and clubs with sports facilities; see their [website](#) for more. Internships, including placements in primary schools, are a good way to connect with Cork's community.

# HOW TO APPLY

⇒ **Attend Study Abroad 101**

Held weekdays at the I-House. See website for schedule ([www.du.edu/intl/abroad/info\\_sessions.html](http://www.du.edu/intl/abroad/info_sessions.html)).

⇒ **Attend a Regional Advising Session**

Mandatory if you are considering Ireland or the UK. See website for schedule (same link as above).

⇒ **Meet with an international education advisor.**

Learn about your options and get answers to your questions.

⇒ **Apply for a passport—<http://travel.state.gov/passport>**

If you already have one, make sure you know where it is and when it expires.

⇒ **Apply to study abroad!**
