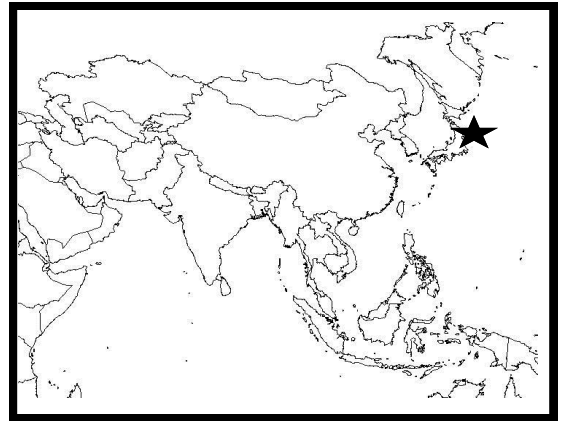

PROGRAM

IES Center in Nagoya offers excellent learning opportunities at Nanzan University. Nanzan is a private university with a well established Center for Japanese Studies. At the Center, the area studies courses are offered in English for the foreign students. The University is located in the hills above Nagoya.

ACADEMICS

You are required to take Japanese language whether at the intermediate or advanced level. You then can choose from a variety of courses taught in English and/or Japanese, including business, culture, economics, history, literature, political science, religion, sociology and studio arts. During the fall there are some regular courses at the University open to IES students. It is very competitive and thus requires an early application.

CULTURAL CONNECTIONS

IES organizes optional field trips—for example to Kyoto—as an integral part of the program. Throughout the semester, cultural events and guest lectures are arranged. Nanzan also offers opportunities for you to participate in the culture and get to know Japanese students.

LOCATION: NAGOYA, JAPAN

With a population of over two million people, Nagoya is the 4th largest city in Japan. It is an important industrial and cultural center located on the main island of Honshu. Due to the destruction caused by World War II, the city has been rebuilt and is very modern. It has wide streets and tall skyscrapers with an excellent mass transit system, yet maintains an historic feel with the Nagoya castle with its gardens and museums. The Central Japan International Airport is famous for being built on a man-made island in the Ise Bay. The historic capital of Japan, Kyoto, is a short train ride away.

HOUSING & MEALS

You have three options for housing. You can stay in a host family setting where you will receive breakfast and dinner with your family. The home stay option is the most popular as you can truly get immersed into the culture and utilize your language skills daily. Homestays can be located throughout the city so you need to be prepared to travel some distance to get to the University. The University also offers private residence halls much like dormitories. Some of these halls are located close to campus while others are further away from campus. The meal plans also vary by the hall. Finally, there is an International Residence Hall located on campus. This hall places students with native Japanese speakers in shared suites with private bedrooms. There are no meal plans with this option and limited cooking facilities so you should plan to eat out at restaurants for most meals.
