PreventionAction.org, July 22—A new study based on data from the Colorado Project of Economic Strain, published this month in the journal *Anxiety, Stress and Coping* has found that involuntary stress responses can seriously affect the long-term mental health of those living in poverty. Brian Wolff and his team at the University of Denver assessed involuntary responses to stress using standardized questionnaires, looking specifically at rumination, intrusive thoughts, impulsive action, emotional arousal and physical reactions.

Wichita Eagle, July 22—Sedgwick County District Judge Tim Lahey will decide whether to prevent the Kansas attorney general from shutting down a Texas Hold ‘Em-type game called *Kandu Challenge* that was played for the past year at Highlands Gastropub and Cardroom in Wichita. Black America Web, July 20—President Barack Obama says he’s trying to right past wrongs by creating a sweeping proposal to allocate billions of federal dollars to urban areas for a range of initiatives. Charles D. Ellison, a senior fellow in public policy and chief advisor for the Center for New Politics and Policy at the University of Denver, said the President Obama is redefining “urban” as an empowerment model and addressing the issue for communities of color concentrated in urban centers.

Oklahoman, July 21—The religious imagery and end-of-days tribulations of Roland Emmerich’s “2012,” will resonate with audiences — particularly young people — who take their spiritual cues from pop culture, experts say. “Hollywood movies tend to succeed if they don’t underestimate (the sophistication of) their audience,” said Lynn Clark, associate professor of new media at the University of Denver. “There is an urgency for (spiritual discovery) that is part of the undercurrent of young people’s lives these days.”

U.S. News and World Report, July 22—Male breadwinners have lost their jobs at a greater clip than women during this recession—or “he-cession,” as some call it. And more than a few therapists say they’re seeing an uptick in relationship problems as a result. It’s not so much that laid-off traditionalists are resentful of their breadwinning wives. Resentment, they’re noting, often flows from the other side. Root for your partner, advises Howard Markman, a professor of psychology at the University of Denver and a couples therapist and couples researcher. **Albany Times-Union, July 29**, also quoted Markman.

Fox News, July 26—Raja Raghunath, a University of Denver assistant professor and former labor attorney, tells Fox News that federal courts consider three things in deciding if an employer has made reasonable accommodations: Do alternatives exist, has the company made good faith attempts at accommodation and third, what is the competition doing?

Milwaukee Business Journal, July 31—Apartment vacancies in metro Denver hit their highest level in four years in the second quarter of 2009, according to a Colorado Division of Housing report. “Our increase in apartment vacancy rate is directly related to employment,” said Gordon Von Stroh, business professor at the University of Denver and report researcher. “Look at Douglas County, where the employment situation is pretty positive, and you had only a 5.8 percent vacancy rate.” **Denver Business Journal, July 30**, also reported this story.

Live Well Colorado Times, July Issue—Kaiser Permanente staff interviewed Beth Walker, program coordinator at DU’s Wellness Living and Learning Community, about how summer is a good time to plan ahead before students return in the fall.

Denver Post, July 5—Denver Mayor John Hickenlooper wants to compile an enormous database to give teachers, social workers and mentors a fuller picture of what the city’s children are going through — be it a divorce, a falling algebra grade or an arrest. DPS officials say they look forward to working with the city on the project, but “need to make sure that any information about our kids is shared responsibly,” said spokesman Michael Vaughn. People with case files may believe their particular information — like whether a child is on food stamps — is catalogued for a distinct purpose and won’t be broadly seen or analyzed, said Kevin O’Brien, a professor of ethics and legal studies at the University of Denver’s Daniels College of Business. **Westword Blog, July 8**, also quoted O’ Brien.

KUSA-TV (Channel 9), July 8—A recent study from the Kauffman Foundation found that people between 55 and 64 made up the highest percentage of entrepreneurs for any age group. “I see a lot of people that don’t want to retire,” said University of Denver Business Professor Bob McGowan. McGowan says baby boomers have found the economy especially difficult because their age group is finding it hardest to get a new job. Denver Post, July 9—In Judge Naves’ opinion, Ward Churchill had no right to sue, so he threw out the jury’s decision and named CU the winner in the case. And the right to immunity isn’t the only legal ground that Naves cites in his ruling, said Martin Katz, interim dean of the University of Denver’s Sturm College of Law. **ColoradoDaily.com, July 22**, also quoted Katz.

Denver Post, July 10—Airlines around the world are flocking to two-dimensional bar codes. With their boxes and blots, 2-D bar codes are encoded vertically and horizontally, providing room for information on airline passengers and their onboard preferences. “All the linear code can do is tell you who the manufacturer is and what the product number is,” said Paul Nuzum, an adjunct business faculty member at the University of Denver. The 2-D bar code “can store information on the tag itself, and you don’t need a link to a database to get the information you need,” Nuzum said.

Denver Post, July 10—The moment Rose Medical Center announced that a rogue employee had allegedly exposed thousands of its patients to hepatitis C, it set in motion a delicate dance between informing the public and protecting its professional reputation. Alan Moorer, director of the professional communications program at the University of Denver’s Josef Korbel School of International Studies, said it would have been worse to wait until all possible victims were identified before going public. “People are already complaining that they knew nothing until they heard it on TV or read it in the newspaper,” he said.

Denver Business Journal, July 10—Joseph Nacchio’s attorney, Maureen Mahoney, argued the trial and appellate courts incorrectly deemed Qwest’s internal revenue forecasts for 2001 “material” information that should’ve been disclosed before Nacchio sold stock. “If the justices take this, they’ll take it because of the materiality issue,” said J. Robert Brown, a professor at the University of Denver Sturm College of Law who has expertise in securities litigation and has followed Nacchio’s case. Denver Post, July 15—Southwest’s short point to-point flights instead of a hub-and-spoke system could contribute to stress on fuselages, said a University of Denver law school professor who is a trained airline-crash investigator. “Air-frame fatigue is really correlated with cycles — how many times you’ve filled the plane with air to pressurize it and then depressurized it,” said Scott Johns, who also is a former airline pilot.

Denver Daily News, July 16—Ethanol-blended gasoline burns at high temperatures during the summer, emitting more hydrocarbons, which increases ozone levels, said University of Denver professor Donald Stedman. “Hydrocarbons and sunshine, the complexity of it has been understood for the last 30 years,” Stedman told the Denver Daily News in August 2007 when his report surfaced. “But somehow the bureaucrats don’t understand.”

KUSA-TV (Channel 9), July 19—Some retail stores are banking on Christmas in July sales to bring in more foot traffic and improve their lackluster sales. “All of them have summer sales, but I think this is an order of magnitude different in terms of those sales,” says DU Professor of Finance Ron Rizzuto. “I think it’s great news for the consumer,” said Rizzuto. “We’re all trying to cut back and live within our means, and the sales will help us and certainly help retailers as well.”

KUSA-TV (Channel 9), July 20—The recession may be over – that’s what some economists think the numbers are showing. But it will probably take awhile longer for Americans to see the evidence of it in our everyday lives. “Even if you told me, as a business, that all these statistics tell me the recession is ending, if I still see a lot of items on my shelves that aren’t selling, then I’m not ready to go out and buy more goods that I can sell or increase my capacity so I can produce more goods and services until I get the sales,” University of Denver Professor Mac Clouse said. **Denver Post, July 26**, also quoted Clouse.
