Tom Knecht, Professor, Political Science

Professor Knecht's research interests include American foreign policy, public opinion, and the American presidency. He has taught service learning courses on American public opinion and has worked closely with Project Homeless Connect, conducting pre- and post-surveys for volunteers to measure shifts in their attitudes about the homeless in order to dispel myths and misunderstandings about homeless individuals and their families.

Ingrid Tague, Associate Professor and Department Chair, History

Professor Tague teaches European history from the Middle Ages to the nineteenth century. She is a specialist in early modern British history, with a particular interest in cultural and gender history. Her book, *Women of Quality: Accepting and Contesting Ideals of Femininity in England, 1690-1760*, was published in 2002. Her current research includes the history of pets and pet keeping in the eighteenth century.

Joan Winn, Professor of Management, Daniels College of Business

Professor Winn has conducted research on business turnarounds, entrepreneurship and strategic positioning, discrimination and harassment, international management and organizational culture. She is considered an expert in case research and has written several case studies on women-owned businesses in the US and in the Czech Republic.
