DOMESTIC OR INTERNATIONAL ENGAGEMENT EXPERIENCE (4 credits)
<i>The engagement experience enriches students' understandings of issues related to cultural diversity and global (in)justice through an approved 4-credit internship, service learning, or field-based research project at DU or abroad. Students may enroll in a second engagement experience, which will count for elective credit toward the minor.</i>
ELECTIVES (16 credits)
<i>Elective courses deepen students' intercultural knowledge through four 2000+ level DU courses that expose them to a wide range of topics and materials. Students should work with an IGS adviser to focus their courses around a specific theme. No more than two elective courses can be taken in the same department or program.</i>
