

Your Next Steps Checklist – English Conditional Admission (ECA)

Congratulations again on your admission to the University of Denver! We are excited to have you join our community of students and scholars from across the world. Please pay attention to the following important deadlines and complete the steps below to confirm your enrollment and start your journey to Denver.

English Conditional Admission (ECA)

Before you begin your degree program, you must successfully complete the appropriate level of intensive English at the University of Denver's English Language Center (ELC) or submit a qualifying TOEFL, IELTS, CAE, or Duolingo score to our office. Each level of English at the ELC corresponds to one quarter (ten weeks of study), and it generally takes 3-5 quarters to complete all required levels. If you are currently enrolled at the English Language Center, you must successfully complete the LAUNCH curriculum in order to continue at the University of Denver.

All students who are not native English speakers, both those offered Regular Admission and those who complete the English Conditional Admission program, are required to complete at least one English course in the LAUNCH curriculum: a series of up to three English classes that count towards the foreign language requirements for your degree. The LAUNCH classes are designed to help you be more successful in your academic program by improving your English ability, teaching you about being part of an American university, and helping you explore U.S. culture.

Deadlines

- May 1, 2021: Deadline to submit your Admission Response Form and pay your tuition and housing deposit. This form and your deposit can be found on your application portal: http://admission.du.edu/apply/status
- ☐ July 1, 2021: Final deadline to submit a qualifying TOEFL, IELTS, CAE, or Duolingo score and change your admission to Regular Admission.
 - O Qualifying scores include a minimum TOEFL score of at least 80 iBT, with no less than 18 on each subscore; a minimum IELTS score of at least a 6.5, with no less than 5.5 on each individual band score; or a minimum grade of C on the CAE. If you are unable to take any of these exams, we will accept a Duolingo English Test score of at least 105.
 - o If you are a transfer student you can qualify for Regular Admission by:
 - Completing both English Composition I and II with grades of C- or higher.
 - Completing 30 semester hours of transferable credit from a college or university where English is the language of instruction and examination.
- July 1, 2021: Deadline to submit your final high school transcript and required official certificates and records (not applicable to transfer students).

Next Steps

- □ Submit the Admission Response form and pay your deposit: As soon as you have decided to join us you can submit this form and payment on your application portal: http://admission.du.edu/apply/status. Remember, the deadline is May 1st!
- □ Submit the English Language Center Application: if you choose to join our English Language Center you must submit this application. It can be found in your application portal and includes paying an administrative fee and agreeing to the Statement of Understanding for ECA admission.



Next Steps (Continued)

- ☐ Submit the documents we need to issue your I-20: If you are planning to study on a student visa (F-1), we will issue you a certificate of eligibility (I-20) that you can use to apply for a visa at your local U.S. Embassy or Consulate. Before we can issue you an I-20 you must submit to us:
 - o A scan of the biographical page of your passport
 - o The Admitted Student Supplement & Financial Verification form (available on your application portal)
 - Financial documents showing you can pay for at least one year of study at DU (estimated costs (see next page) minus any scholarships we have offered you)
 - o If you are studying in the U.S. already on an F-1 visa, submit the SEVIS Transfer Eligibility Form: https://www.du.edu/sites/default/files/2018-04/sevistransferform.pdf
- Apply for housing: First-year and second-year students under the age of 21 are required to live on campus or at home with a parent. If you are required to live on-campus, you will need to submit a housing deposit with your response form. Housing contracts must be completed online through PioneerWeb, instructions can be found here: http://www.du.edu/housing/student/applying.html.
- ☐ Keep up the good work: By its approval of your application, the Admission Committee assumes that you will complete your current academic work satisfactorily, including any intensive English language studies at the DU ELC or elsewhere. In case of a significant change in your academic performance or if you are involved in any illegal or disciplinary matters, the University of Denver reserves the right to withdraw our offer of admission.



Estimated Expenses – Academic Year 2021-2022

These are the estimated MINIMUM expenses for <u>undergraduate</u> international students at the University of Denver for the 2021-2022 academic year. These estimates assume a moderate lifestyle in which students share living accommodations and expenses with a roommate and do not include international travel or the purchase of a laptop computer, a requirement for most students. All University of Denver students are required to have health insurance. Students are required to participate in the University of Denver Student Health Insurance Plan (SHIP), or to waive this plan by providing proof of other adequate health insurance coverage. The academic year consists of three quarters or **nine months**. If you choose to remain in the United States during the summer quarter (three months), you will be responsible for additional expenses. If you take classes in the summer, you will also be responsible for additional tuition and fees not included in this estimate.
