In order to transfer to DU with junior standing and lower division requirements completed, students will need to complete the following through electives in their associate's degree:

- A GTPathways mathematics course which meets DU's Al-Natural requirement (4.5 to 7.5 credits).
- A foreign language course numbered 112 or higher (4.5 to 7.5 credits).
- Students should complete two or three psychology courses beyond PSY 101 and 102 prior to transferring.
- Students will need to take either BIO 112 or CHE 112 to complete the year-long SI: Natural sequence.
- Students pursuing a BS degree at the University of Denver must complete a major and two minors or two majors and one minor. One minor must be in one of the natural sciences.

Students who complete a DwD pursuant to the prescribed curriculum in this transfer articulation agreement, pass all 60 credits with a C- or higher, and are admitted to the University of Denver's corresponding degree program are guaranteed the following:

- 1. Students will enter the University of Denver with junior standing if determined by eligible transfer credit. PLA credit of AP, IB, or other transferred credit must meet University of Denver eligibility.
- 2. Students will have met the University of Denver's lower-division common curriculum requirements if all credit is eligible for transfer.
- 3. Students will have the same graduation requirements as students who begin and complete this degree program at the four-year institution.
- 4. Admission to a receiving institution does not guarantee enrollment in a specific degree program. Some programs at receiving institutions have controlled entry due either to space limitations or academic requirements.
- 5. The credit and course transfer guarantees described in this agreement apply to the specific degree programs covered by this document. If the student changes majors, receiving institutions will evaluate application of the courses designated in this agreement to other degree programs on a course-by-course basis.
- 6. Only courses with grades of C- or higher are guaranteed to transfer.
- 7. Credit earned as pass/fail can be transferred only as elective credit. This credit does not apply to specific degree requirements other than total hours for graduation, and the University must determine that "P" (pass) equals 1.7 (C-) or better performance.
- 8. On-line and distance courses are not categorically restricted, but may be refused based on instruction methodologies not equivalent to those at the University of Denver.
- 9. The maximum credit that may be accepted from a two-year institution is 96 quarter hours.
